Narcan (Naloxone)

 Narcan can stop an overdose from heroin or pain killers and save the person's life

Narcan:

- is an opiate blocker
- counteracts the slowing of the central nervous and respiratory systems
- returns the person to normal breathing
- may be injected in the muscle, vein or under the skin, or may be sprayed into the nose

Minutes count Call immediately!

Signs of an Opiate Overdose

- struggling to breathe or snoring in an unusual way
- not reacting to attempts to awaken
- hands, face, and/or lips turning purple or blue
- not responding to pain
- complaining about being too hot
- vomiting, or
- acting unreasonable or appearing confused

What to DO

DO call 911 immediately for medical intervention DO use Narcan if available DO try to awaken the person by rubbing knuckles hard against the chest bone DO clear the airway, pinch the nose closed, and blow air into the mouth **DO** position the person on their side if vomiting DO keep the person warm and stay until help arrives **DO** share information about what drugs were used, and DO leave everything in the room in place

What NOT to do

DON'T allow the person to "sleep it off"
DON'T put the person in a bath, shower, or ice
DON'T give the person any substance (except Narcan)
DON'T leave the person alone or unattended, and

Ohio Senate Bill 117 (Casey's Law for Ohio)

Ohio families have a mechanism to help their friends and family members who struggle with the disease of addiction.

Casey's Law provides a means of intervention with someone who is unable to recognize his or her needs for treatment due to their addiction. Casey's Law allows parents, relatives, and/or friends to petition the court for treatment on behalf of the person (over the age of 18) who is abusing alcohol and/or drugs (respondent). The treatment options available under the law can vary depending on circumstances of each individual case, and can range from detoxification to intensive treatment through recovery. The person seeking the involuntary treatment (petitioner) is obligated to pay all costs incurred in the process as well as all cost of treatment and must sign a guaranty of payment.

Under Casey's law, a person suffering from drug or alcohol abuse will not be ordered to undergo involuntary treatment unless that person presents an imminent threat of danger to their self, family or others as a result of alcohol or drug abuse, or there exists a substantial likelihood of such a threat of danger in the near future.
